Youth Participation in Employment Policies

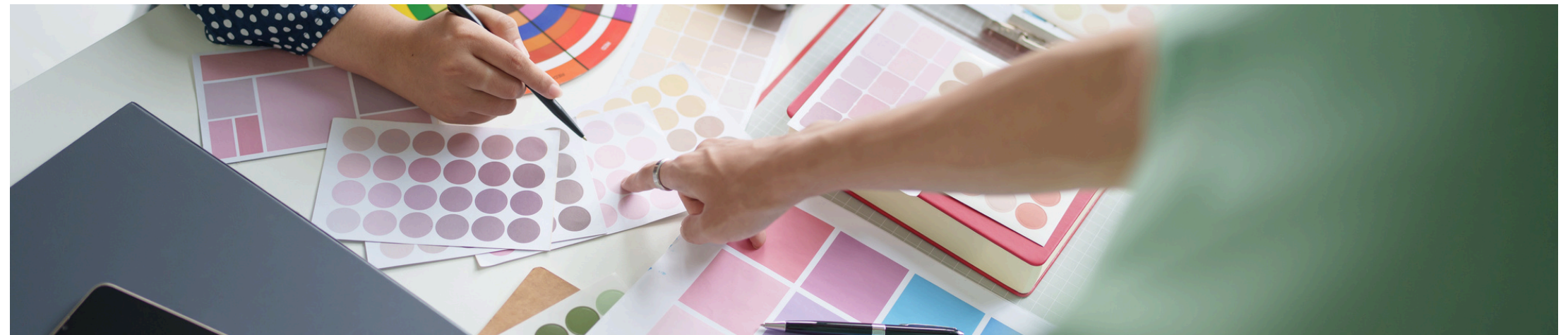

- Future trends in the labour market



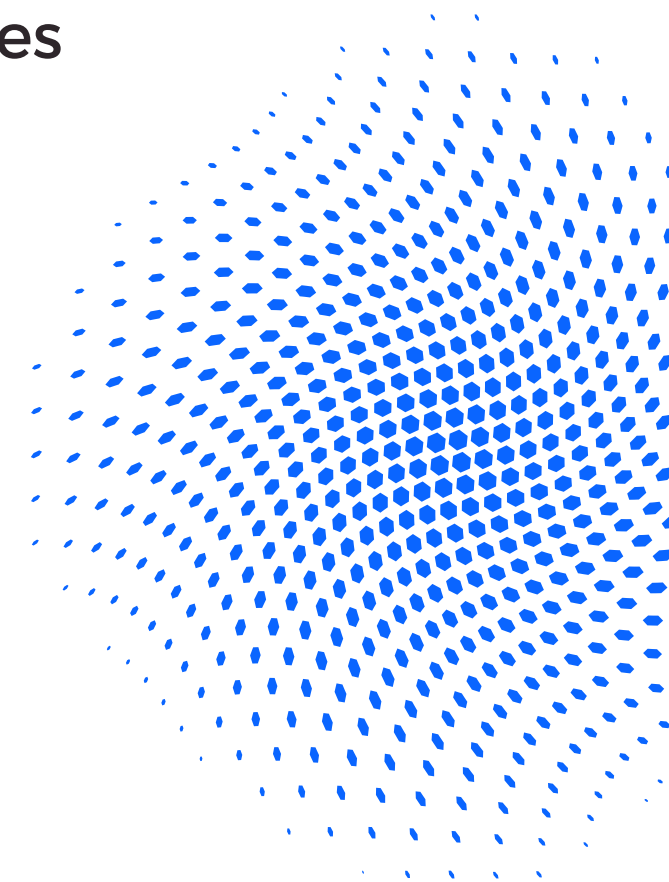
Youth Participation in Employment Policies
